Jim Duffy's practice spans inquests and inquiries, clinical negligence, personal injury, public law, indirect tax and employment. He is a member of the Attorney General's 'A' Panel of London Counsel.

Jim initially practised in human rights law as a solicitor for three years, dual-qualified in Scotland, England & Wales. He transferred to the Bar in 2012.

He went on to act as Judicial Assistant to Lord Reed and Lord Hodge. He has returned to the Supreme Court twice since then, most recently in *Majera (Rwanda) v SSHD*, where he made submissions on behalf of the Home Secretary.

He graduated from the University of Glasgow in Law with French Language (First Class Honours; McCormick Prize for the Most Distinguished Graduate in Law). He has a Masters degree (LL.M) from the University of Toronto (Rotary Scholar), and also spent a year at Paul Cézanne Université in Aix-en-Provence, France. He went on to intern at UNHCR in Geneva and undertook an exchange to the Paris Bar in 2016.

Selected Cases

- **Oliver Steeper inquest (2024)**: Jim acted for Ofsted in connection with the death of a baby following a choking incident at nursery.

- **Abbigail Smith inquest (2024)**: Jim is representing the family of a 26-year-old woman who was discharged from a psychiatric in-patient facility on 14 February 2022. Abbi was found dead the following day having apparently ligatured. Her case was investigated by Channel 4's *Dispatches* programme.
- **Mitchell Oakley inquest (2024-25)**: Jim acts for the family of a father-of-two who absconded from a hospital after being admitted following a suicide attempt. He was later found hanging from a tree in nearby woods.

Personal Injury

Jim has an established practice in personal injury acting on behalf of claimants and defendants, including in abuse claims. He was led by Elizabeth-Anne Gumbel KC, appearing for the appellant children in *CN & GN v. Poole Borough Council*. The Supreme Court considered whether and in what circumstances local authorities might owe a duty at common law to children at risk of harm.

He has been instructed in a number of cases involving E-Coli 0157 and has defended several claims brought by members of fitness gyms. He has also acted for insurers and injured persons in claims arising from road traffic accidents and represented claimants and defendants in numerous occupiers' liability claims.

Public Law

Jim has built upon his previous experience as a solicitor involved in high-profile judicial review claims by

acting for prisoners seeking to challenge decisions relating to their security categorisation. Since his appointment to the Attorney General's Panel, he has also receives instructions in defendant judicial review work.

Jim has helped prisoners serving indeterminate sentences to argue that the prison authorities have failed to enable them to demonstrate, at or near the end of their tariff periods, that they are suitable for release or for transfer to open conditions. He appeared as junior counsel in a judicial review relating to the joint enterprise murder conviction of [Anthony Davis](#). Led by Clodagh Bradley KC, Jim acts for a number of fertility clinics in a judicial review challenge to 'traffic light' guidance issued by the Human Fertilization and Embryology Authority in relation to so-called 'add-on' treatments.

He also regularly uses his human rights law experience to inform his approach to cases across his other practice areas.

Jim was instructed in the Undercover Policing Inquiry from 2017, before stepping down in 2020. He was led by Sarabjit Singh KC in *Majera*, a Supreme Court case relating to the bail powers of immigration tribunals.

Employment & Equality

Jim has appeared in many employment cases over the course of the last decade. He has been instructed by unions in claims giving rise to issues of discrimination, whistleblowing and TUPE and often represents central government departments as a member of the Attorney General's London 'A' Panel.

He is able to draw upon his wider experience in human rights, public law and mental health to inform his approach to claims in the Employment Tribunal.

involving a group of nursery workers. The tribunal initially reconsidered its decision to find for the Claimants, but upheld that decision following written submissions.

- **J & Others v S:** advised the claimant care workers in relation to a holiday pay claim.
- **CAM v HMRC:** Represented HMRC in an unfair dismissal claim (decision pending).
